Anal Gland Expression

As with anything in life, there are many different opinions and views. By no means is anal gland expression excluded from this “club”.

The anal glands are two sac like structures located in the anus area in dogs and cats. They periodically fill up with a foul smelling and thick secretion called anal gland secretion. Some animals never need their glands expressed, as it is supposed to be a process that happens naturally while they defecate. Those who cannot do this process naturally, need assistance.

For health debated reasons, anal gland expression is not a normal part of the offered services at Cross Town Pet Care, LLC. Many “assume” that groomers who don’t offer it, do so due to the “dirty” nature of the job, that is not always the case. Remember, a professional groomer is a groomer, essentially a hair stylist for pets, not a trained health professional such as veterinarian or doctor who is trained to recognize and deal with health related problems. Ask yourself this, would you ask your hair stylist to look at a cancer spot on your head and tell you if it is cancerous or to do any other health related task?

Anal Gland Issues:

- Impaction
- Infection
- Abscess
- Rupture
- Tumors
- Cancer
- Damage to the sphincter muscle can occur from anal gland expression

Signs of needing the anal glands expressed are listed below. Keep in mind though, that just because your pet may have some of the following symptoms, it could mean something else is wrong other than anal gland issues. The other issues could be worms, skin infection, stool adhered to fur and more.

Signs of Anal Gland Issues:

- Scooting
- Licking the anal region
- Reluctance in defecating
- Discomfort when the anal area is touched
